2018 marks the 150th anniversary of the appointment of Donald Harvey MacVicar to be professor of theology at the Presbyterian College, Montreal. For the next half century, MacVicar would help shape the PCC's life.

Another professor, at Knox College, John Proudfoot, son of a noteworthy pioneer, would take his students in very different directions, seeking to make the pulpit respond to a fast-changing culture and as a result losing his own pulpit after division.

As wife to Rev. Ewan Macdonald in Leaskdale, Ontario, L. M. Montgomery could say little about the drive to Church Union in 1925; however, in her detailed, insightful journals, the author of *Anne of Green Gables* (1908) expresses what she thought of it and exposes what it was like to contend with changes caused by it.

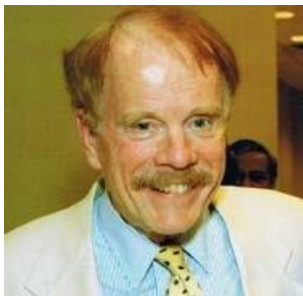

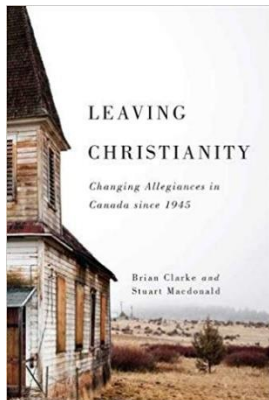

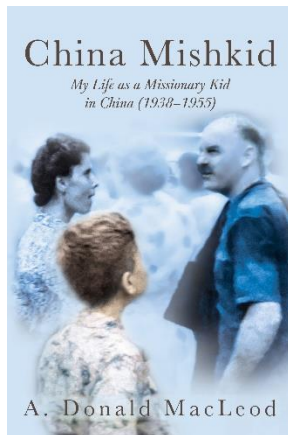


### BOOK SIGNING AT THE MEETING BY PAST AND FUTURE PRESIDENTS
